- **5 Baldrige examiners from Wisconsin volunteered about \$112,500 in services in 2020.**

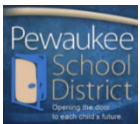

Success Story



Pewaukee School District, located in Waukesha County, Wisconsin (outside Milwaukee), has an enrollment of 2,760 students. The district includes four schools (two elementary schools, one middle school and one high school) housed on an 85-acre campus that serves students from both the city and village of Pewaukee. The district is staffed by 296 employees and operates under a budget of \$28.6 million.

Highlights

- 93.8% parent satisfaction with educational quality in 2012-2013
- 91.5%–94.8% parent satisfaction with communication in 2012-2013, compared with a national average of 74%
- 0.09% dropout rate, better than the county, the state, and nearby high-performing districts by a factor of 5 to 15
- Economically disadvantaged students achieving 45.5% proficiency compared with scores below 33% for similar students in the county, the state, and nearby high-performing schools on the state proficiency tests
- Named one of Wisconsin's Top 100 Workplaces for 2011, 2012 and 2013
