In collaboration with the Baldrige community, the Baldrige Program offers a systems approach to organizational excellence, award-winning leadership development, self-assessment tools, organizational assessments by trained experts, workshops on how to improve, and events that showcase best management practices.

Baldrige in Texas

- 92 Texas applicants for the Baldrige Award (2005–2020)
- 7 Texas award applicants in 2017–2020 represent 20,968 jobs, 179 work locations, over \$879 million in revenues/budgets, and an estimated 3.9 billion customers served.
- 28 Baldrige examiners from Texas volunteered about \$630,000 in services in 2020.

Success Story



Alamo Colleges District is the largest provider of higher education in South Texas. Its five independent colleges provide two-year degrees that focus on preparing students to transfer to baccalaureate-granting institutions and workforce development programs that help build new careers and meet the needs of business; 10 education and training centers that offer a wide range of education and training for the community and military; and three district support operations centers.

Highlights

- 150% increase in 4-year graduation rate, the best in the state
- Increase in scholarship awardees from 580 to 2,175, and increase in amount from \$500,000 to over \$2 million
- Doubling in number of degrees and certificates awarded over 4 years, 3 times the state norm
- 88.4% student satisfaction with the overall educational experience, more than 2 points higher than the national norm

The Alliance for Performance Excellence (www.BaldrigeAlliance.org) is a nonprofit national network of Baldrige-based organizations with a mission to grow performance excellence. Alliance members include Baldrige-based programs that use the Baldrige Excellence Framework to serve organizations from all sectors in their region, state, or industry. These programs annually evaluate and recognize over 1,000 organizations and serve as the feeder system for the national Baldrige Award.

The Quality Texas Foundation (www.quality-texas.org) was organized by the governor in 1994 to use the Baldrige Criteria to improve Texas organizations. We offer writing seminars, leadership training, strategic planning, customer focus training, and workforce development training to accomplish our work. We have six levels of application to allow any type of organization to begin the Baldrige journey.
